THE NEW MEDICAL CLINIC HIGHLIGHT

Damou Christian Mission is

a three-part ministry, consisting of the church, the school and now the clinic. The Damou Medical Clinic opened to patients in January of 2019. The mission wants to be diligent to foster growth in the clinic to maximize its impact as well.

The Damou Medical Clinic (DMC) serves the community of Cyvadier, Jacmel. It is located just around the corner from the school and church. Use of the clinic is expected to rise with the hiring of a gynecologist (will start in October) and two maternity nurses. The nurses have set days at the clinic and are also on call should any of our ladies in the Milk for Mothers program go into labor. The DMC is blessed as well by Dr. Francky, a graduate of Damou's sponsorship program, who has completed his medical training and decided to fulfill his required year of service to the Haitian government with us. These recent additions to our staff have increased the number and types of patients we can serve. The clinic

now has the capacity to attend to people who would have previously needed to travel to St. Michel, the larger hospital in downtown Jacmel.

These recent expansions are exciting because we see the opportunity to touch more lives with each new staff member. Our two nurses, Iphigenie and Darline, and Dr. Claude have already been impacting members of the community since the doors opened.

Medicine is a unique medium for ministry. It provides unique and powerful opportunities to reach the lost. This theory stands for medicine anywhere in the world but has proven even more potent in Haiti. Medical professionals have the chance to be there for people at some of the lowest and most vulnerable moments

of their lives. Many patients wait until their condition is severe to acknowledge the problem and seek help. This is the space where staff gets to provide comfort while pointing them back to Jesus. It is for this reason that we have prayerfully selected our physicians and supporting staff.

The special thing about the clinic's staff, as we have briefly mentioned, is that several of them were brought up in the school's sponsorship program. Our mission believes one good indicator of successful ministry is recipients who decide to give back—to serve



alongside the program which served them. Loubens, director, is one example of many mission-wide who have chosen to stay with Damou. It is a blessing that this trend is occurring at the clinic as well, and certainly has helped us find those special staff members to carry out our impact vision.

Medicine in a developing nation naturally looks and functions much differently than in the United States. The DMC is a beautiful space and has potential to be even more efficient with a few easy changes.

Loubens, Jessica, and Jessie,
Damou's recent medical intern,
have discussed ways to further
streamline how the clinic operates.
The goal is not to make our clinic
resemble western medicine—that is
not reasonable for most healthcare
institutions in Haiti. We just want to
maximize the space and equipment
we have been blessed with.

One main area that can be currently improved is the sustainability of the clinic. This differs again from the healthcare systems in the United States. **Damou is a nonprofit organization and the**

clinic is special because the patients are not charged for their consultations. This results in the purchase of medications being the clinic's sole current source of income. The mission does not regret making the decision to make consultations free, but does experience some financial strain when covering the cost of supplies, medications and payroll. Income will improve with the addition of ultrasounds, and X-rays. We have taken other practical steps recently to reduce costs, such as installing the solar panels and digging a separate septic system for our laboratory. The solar panels will cut the cost it takes to run the generator and the septic system will cut the cost of waste disposal.

The DMC also works monthly to account for purchases and find ways to further streamline them. The mission is very grateful for donors who help make up for financial deficits at the clinic as we are still working out these "bugs."

We are hopeful that the clinic's sustainability will continue to improve, with the goal of eventually being self-sufficient. ♥





MILK FOR MOTHERS ADAPTS DURING COVID-19

The Milk for Mothers program is continuing in a modified format. Distribution is now every three weeks with increased supplies given and interaction is limited to meet COVID-19 guidance. This service is vital for the survival of these women and families.

VILLAGE OF HOPE

Linda Roller is in Haiti and is overseeing the Village of Hope, elderly program. The elderly are adhering to the shelter-in-place guidance and any outside interaction has been cut off to protect their health. A doctor from the clinic is checking on them weekly.



SCHOOL & CHURCH AMIDST COVID-19

We would also like to update you on the current status of the other parts of our ministry during the COVID-19 wave. The mission's work will not stop, thanks to electronic communication and effective leadership on the ground by our many incredible Haitian staff. The school is currently closed and the church is not gathering on

Sunday's (online sermons), but the mission is maintaining its functions after having adjusted to the government's COVID-19 regulations. The school is scheduled to resume classes at the end of April, Godwilling. We look forward to getting back to serving at full capacity again but we trust that God's plans for this time are good.

A STORY OF HOPE: BEFORE & AFTER

When little Kerry was brought to DCM, he was just a year a half old, weighing a mere 8 pounds. He was developmentally behind and not thriving, unable to walk or crawl. After 2 months in our care, he weighs a healthy 16 pounds! He has changed dramatically and now is crawling and on the verge of walking.



PRAYER REQUESTS

- Pray the Eugene family can return safely once the crisis has calmed down so they can assist in serving the community where the current needs may be.
- That the clinic can become more self-sufficient and more donors join efforts to help provide the necessary materials needed.
- Pray for protection over Haiti as they have been hit so hard already.
- That God can use Damou as the light that shines in the darkness.

CURRENT NEEDS

- Funds to add a maternity wing to the clinic \$15,000
- Vehicle fund for the missionaries \$20,000
